Now Accepting Nominations

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The Vigil Honor is the highest honor that a Lodge can bestow upon a member. It dates back to 1915 when our Founder, Dr. E. Urner Goodman became the first Vigil Honor Member. It is a mark of high distinction and is reserved for those arrowmen who, by reason of exceptional service, personal effort, and unselfish interest, have made distinguished contributions beyond the immediate responsibilities of their position of office to one or more of the following: their lodge, the Order of the Arrow, Scouting, or their Scout Camp. Under no circumstances should tenure in Scouting or the Order of the Arrow be considered as reason enough for a Vigil Honor recommendation. The Vigil Honor is a recognition of one's commitment to altruistic leadership and proper example of Brotherhood in Cheerful Service. Alertness to the needs of others is the mark of the Vigil Honor.

Any member of the Order of the Arrow registered in Scouting and in good standing in a regu-

larly chartered lodge is eligible for recommendation to the national Order of the Arrow Committee for elevation to the Vigil Honor provided that, at the time of the recommendation, the individual has meet all of the criteria bellow, been a Brotherhood member for a minimum of two years. A lodge may nominate a maximum of two percent of their registered Arrowmen once a year, through the Vigil Honor petition, found in the annual re-charter packet. At least 50 percent of all nominated must be under 21 at the time of nomination.

In order to be nominated the individual must:

1. Be Brotherhood member for at least two years.
2. Be registered in Northeastern Pennsylvania Council
3. Be a member in good standing of Lowwapaneu Lodge.

Nominations for the Vigil Honor ought to be taken seriously. Please provide as much information about the nominee as

possible. In this way the Vigil Honor Selection Committee can make a fair assessment of the contributions of the nominee to Scouting and the Lodge.

In order for a nomination to be accepted, it must be submitted on an official and current Vigil Honor Nomination form. Any additional information can be attached to the nomination form.

THE DEADLINE FOR SUBMISSION IS DECEMBER 1st. All nominations must be received at the Northeastern Pennsylvania Council Scout Service and Training Center no later then the close of the business day.

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Who Deserves the Highly Respected Founder's Award?

With the death of the Order of the Arrow's Founder, Dr. E. Urner Goodman and co-founder Carroll A. Edson. The reverse of the medallion is inscribed with the words, which immortalize the meaning of the award, "For he who serves his fellows, is, of all his fellows, greatest!" Accompanying the medallion is an engraved certificate with appropriate national and local signatures. The award recognition piece for the Arrowman's uniform is an arrow ribbon, similar to the universal arrow ribbon, except that it has a gold-colored arrow suspended from a solid red ribbon. Local Lodges may petition the National Committee to present one Founder's Award annually for every 500 lodge members or portion thereof. Since its inception in 1981, only 25 Low-wapaneu brothers have received this award:

with such names as Dalton, Dan Beard, Mid Valley, and Wyoming before the 1991 merger occurred. More recently, in 2006, the Mountain Laurel and Mountain Trailblazer Districts were merged to form the Two Mountains District. This was a successful endeavor as it enhanced Unit Leader, Commissioner, and District Committee participation while significantly increasing program, membership and financial support activities. At the present, the process of merging of the Iron Horse and Dan Beard Districts is underway. We believe that this merger will strengthen the overall quality of the Scouting experience for our youth and adults alike. Your continued support to ensure a smooth merging of the Iron Horse and Dan Beard Districts into one will likewise result in the same overall beneficial outcomes as witnessed in the Two Mountains District.

- Secure Dan Beard’s original Cabin and relocate it to Goose Pond as a facility for regular usage by campers and for historical preservation.
- Add Board membership to COPE/Climbing, Venturing Officer Association and Exploring Officer Association representatives.
- Enhance professional and clerical staff experience.

Attainment of the listed goals requires your full commitment, and serves as a call-to-action. We will not pretend that this will be easy but it is a worthwhile cause. By coming together and contributing our varied skills and strengths to improve our Unit, District and Council we will be successful.

Order of the Arrow Ocean Adventure is Back in Business

After a year without an Order of the Arrow high adventure program, the Florida Sea Base will be offering an Order of the Arrow Ocean Adventure program to service-oriented Arrowmen in the summer of 2011. The new Ocean Adventure has been revamped and will provide a significantly different experience to participants. The new OAOA will introduce Scouts to an environment found only in the magical world of the Florida Keys. Working among tropical islands, coral reefs, and majestic shores Arrowmen will grow and learn together with Scouts from around the nation, working as one in cheerful service.

After arriving at the Sea Base's Brinton Environmental

Center on Summerland Key, all the more about themselves, adventurers will embark on a trip marked with various service experiences around the Keys area. Mobilized by boat, sea kayak, and war canoe, OAOA work crews will provide service and conservation work to a number of different environments, working on trails, islands and fragile habitats for tropical fauna and flora. After 5 days of island hopping and cheerful service, Arrowmen will grab their sea legs and depart on a 5 day cruise of the world's largest wilderness- the deep blue sea. With the help of an OA staff member and a boat captain, Scouts will navigate the Gulf of Mexico in a sailing

yacht, developing team skills and leadership while learning

all the more about themselves, their crew and life at sea aboard a sailing vessel (e.g., fishing, snorkeling, swimming, celestial navigation). The world's oceans remain its largest mystery. Your ocean adventure will lead you to new discoveries about yourself and the world you live in.

A ten day adventure in the Florida Keys awaits you. Discover what servant leadership means to you. All Arrowmen who will be at least 16 and under 21 next summer are invited to apply. Applications are available online at <http://adventure.oa-bsa.org/>. Spots are limited in this inaugural year, so don't wait to apply. The 10-day program costs \$400.



SummitCorps

The New River Experience

is a service adventure from the Order of the Arrow, similar to ArrowCorps5 and the OA High Adventure Programs. Lowwapaneu Lodge will be sending a contingent to SummitCorps during the

week of July 10-16, 2011. SummitCorps will provide exciting opportunities for service, adventure, and recreation. It will be held at the New River Gorge National River in West Virginia.

The site of the SummitCorps is a part of the National Park system, maintained by the US Department of the Interior and the National Park Service. The main focus of SummitCorps will be improving the Garden Grand Hike and Bike Trail. Other projects will include the removal of invasive species. The service area will provide a link between the New River and the Summit, the location of the BSA's new Jamboree site and future high adventure base.

Lowwapaneu has been guaranteed a minimum of 8 participants, with a potential maximum of 23. The estimated cost will be around \$300 and will include transportation. All applicants wishing to attend must send in a completed registration form and a \$100 deposit. The total number of participants is controlled by National, so we will fill the allocated slots as they become available. All remaining applicants after the first 8 guaranteed slots will remain on the waiting list. The \$100 deposit will be refunded if an applicant is not selected to participate.

All participants will be required to meet the BSA High Adventure Height and Weight Requirements. Order Leads Four Programs at Jamboree

The 2010 National Scout Jamboree was a major success! With strong participation and incredible enthusiasm, the Order of the Arrow had great results from the four different programs we offered.

The first area, the Mystery Compass, served approximately 25,000 Scouts. More than just a show, over 300 staff members helped stage the five different acts of the experience.

The first act taught Scouts about teamwork; in the second act scouts were challenged with different obstacles that may occur in life. The third act allowed Scouts to experience the results of being lazy, and the fourth act had Scouts run through an obstacle course to simulate the challenges of life.

The final act brought everything together. Scouts put together the different segments they had gathered throughout the experience to form the Scout fleur-de-lis. "Life gives

you many opportunities. It's the decisions you make that lead you in your life," said Patrick Rooney, director of VIP and guest relations.

PACEsetters was new to the jamboree, and a total of 960 Scouts completed the program. Scouts had to complete a study guide while visiting 12 fitness stations, four of which challenged Scouts physically. The reward for completion was a PACEsetters colored dog tag, a membership card, and their signature on the member board.

"Based upon the positive response, I could envision a program like this conducted on a local and national level in the future," said James Tarbox, associate advisers

The American Indian Village was also very popular, and many Scouts earned the Indian Lore merit badge. Different vignettes were available for Scouts to learn more about American Indian cultures. "The jamboree provided opportuni-

ties for Scouts to learn more about American Indian culture and how to respect it," said Jimmy Dickson, jamboree vice chief of the American Indian Village.

The Indian Village conducted two pow wows throughout the jamboree, and Scouts were encouraged to bring their own regalia and participate.

The Order of the Arrow service corps provided support throughout the jamboree. Composed of 161 Arrowmen from across the country, the team provided 11,196 hours of service. That is approximately 74 hours per Arrowman. "Overall, I think

the service corps did an outstanding job fulfilling the needs of the 2010 National Scout Jamboree," said Will Scott, service corps jamboree vice chief. "I'm proud to be a member of the service corps."

Celebrate Seton's Birth

August 14 marked the 150th anniversary of the birth of one of Scouting's founders and a principal inspiration of the Order of the Arrow—Ernest Thompson Seton.

Born in Scotland, Seton was 5 years old when he and his family traveled to rural Canada. Growing up in the wilds, he learned to camp and hunt, as well as to sketch. His careful artist's eye and habits of obser-

vation made him a keen interpreter of animal life. He studied art in New York, London, and Paris, and worked as a guide and wolf trapper in Manitoba and New Mexico.

Celebrate Seton's Birth *(Continued from Previous Page)*

By 1900, Seton was one of the world's leading authors and illustrators, and an authority on Native Americans. When Seeking to enrich the time of teenage boys, he founded the Woodcraft Indians in 1902, and published The Birchbark Roll of the Woodcraft Indians as its guide in 1906.

That same year, while in London on a speaking tour, he met with British general R.S.S.

Baden-Powell to discuss their common interest in character-building programs for boys. Baden-Powell's Scouting for Boys appeared in January 1908, it included a number of games and activities borrowed from Seton. When the BSA was founded in 1910, Seton became Chief Scout Executive, and he and Baden-Powell jointly authored the Official Handbook.

Seton's writings formed the basis for many youth activities in the early 20th century. Young Carroll Edson heard Seton speak of using the American Indian as an ideal character for training young people, and brought the idea to his new job as assistant camp director of

Philadelphia's Treasure Island Scout Camp, under the leadership of camp director Urner Goodman.

Summer camps frequently adopted ideas from the Birchbark Roll—such as inducting members into honor societies by means of tests, including spending a night alone and a day in silence, performing acts of service, eating only food given to the candidate by the initiators, and the great honor of receiving an Indian name.

Seton left the BSA in 1915 over disagreements with the National Executive Board and Chief Scout Executive James E. West, but was honored by Scouting with one of the first Silver Buffalo Awards in 1925. He died on October 23, 1946.
