2008 LODGE GOALS

Brothers, we have set before ourselves the goals for our lodge for 2008. These were developed at the LLD in January. They are as follows:

- 1. Achieve Quality Lodge for the 12th straight year.
- 2. Attain 30% Brotherhood Conversion
- 3. During the calendar year contact 100% of all new Ordeal members
- 4. Create a web site that is up to date and functional with youth participation.
- 5. Have 67% of our Executive Committee in attendance at all Lodge Activities.
- 6. Complete a major service project at one of our camps during the year.
- 7. Run a successful Fellowship weekend and two successful Ordeals. 8. Run mini LLD trainings at all LEC meetings.
- 9. Conduct quarterly evaluations of all Officers, Chairmen, and Advisors.
- 10. Arrow Corp 5 youth to adult ratio will be 1:1.

With these goals, we can better the lodge through our hard work. Only by working together we can achieve Quality Lodge for the 12th year. To have 30% percent Brotherhood conversion, you eligible brotherhood candidates need to come out to an Ordeal/Fellowship weekend and take your brotherhood!

We plan to personally contact all new Ordeal Candidates through face to face talking or phone calls. Currently the Lodge website is being transferred to the Council's host server and updated! We plan to start building a pavilion at GPSR to be the major camp service project, so with your help we can do it. With your help, we can achieve these goals and have a great 2008 lodge year!



In the summer of 2008, a contingent from Lowwapaneu Lodge will travel to George Washington and Jefferson National Forests in Virginia as part of the 2008 ArrowCorps5 leadership in service initiative. ArrowCorps5 will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for each participant to set an example of leadership in service to those who treasure our national forests. 5,000 Arrowmen will converge on 5 different US Forest Service lands over 5 separate weeks.

The Virginia projects will occur from June 21-June 28, 2008 and will include a full day recreational opportunities such as whitewater rafting, fishing, mountain biking, rock climbing, water skiing and viewing nearby historical sites. The cost to participants is \$250.00. This includes accommodations, meals, recreation and recognition during the project. The age of participants is 15 to adult ... provided participants meet the "Philmont height and weight requirements". To help defray the cost of our transportation, the Lodge will be holding a Burger Burn at Sam's Club on April 20th. See the separate article in this issue of Smoke Signals.

We are asking all Arrowmen to help meet the 2008 Lodge goal of sending a contingent of 1 youth for every adult. At this point, we have more adults than youth. So this is your time to step up to the plate and support one of if not the best Lodge in the Northeast Region. Sign up now by contacting Mr. Minello at: minello@nawarhorse.com.

BURNING ISSUES...ASK MR. DAVE

This is a regular Smoke Signals forum, answered by "MR. DAVE" Srebro, our Lodge Staff Advisor, Professional Scouter, and All-around Good Guy. Ask Mr. Dave anything (well almost anything) that has been a "burning issue" on your mind.



Dear Mr. Dave,

I have heard the Lodge officers and advisors talk about looking sharp and setting the example when it comes to wearing the uniform...right down to the kind of t-shirt to wear under the uniform...are we really that detailed?

Well Aaron, we should always make an extra effort to wear the Scout uniform properly all the time, especially as OA members. Take pride in your uniform...make sure it's clean, pressed, tucked in, all patches in proper place, not too many danglies, all with official BSA pants belt and socks! (See my column from last summer on official shoes.) As for the t-shirt part, well... we do sorta have a little unwritten rule that encourages the wearing of a nice bright white crew neck tee under the uniform shirt. It looks sharp and professional. Recently, Mike Brunetti and I met coincidentally at the mall...we were both shopping for white tees, imagine that. I like Champion brand, but they are not always easy to find locally. Mike swears by Stafford. I picked up a package of BVD heavyweights (for winter) to try them out. Of course the standard Hanes or Fruit of the Loom tees are always a solid fallback. I won't name names, but I even know one Arrowman who irons the part of his tees that show at the neckline! It all might sound a little crazy, but hey, after all, aren't we are supposed to be the National Honor Society of Scouting?

Dear Mr. Dave,

Should I wear my OA sash to my weekly Troop meetings? My SPL says I should, but I remember hearing something about it only worn on special occasions.

Bruce, in keeping with the uniform theme of this column, the answer to your question is no. First of all, you should only wear your OA sash with your **full** uniform (**never ever** with just a t-shirt or class B). Second, only wear your sash at events where you are officially representing the OA or the Lodge such as an OA Troop election, a Lodge meeting or event, OA day at camp, or an event where the OA is officially serving as a service corps or honor guard, like Harvest Fest or Merit Badge College. At all other times, the pocket flap and/or ribbon on your shirt identify you as an Arrowman. Also, your active sash should remain free of any patches, pins, signatures, or any other tchotchke (look that one up!). One last bit of advice...when your sash becomes really worn or stained (from all that cheerful service you've been doing) or if you adults still have the sash you got when you were 14 and the snap is now under your armpit rather than at your waist (for some mysterious reason) it's time to buy a new one, don't be a cheap-o. Again, wear your sash with pride...keep it clean and pressed. And yes, you can machine-wash them...use the gentle cycle with a little Woolite (a tip I learned from Momma Srebro a long time ago).



ANOTHER GOOD BOOK...

Lee Iacocca, "Where Have All the Leaders Gone" Scribner Press, published in April 2007, Hard Cover, \$25.00 List Price, can be purchased through Barnes & Noble or found on their used book site for under \$5.

The first time I wrote this review I got half way through it and realized that I was writing as if you would automatically know who Lee Iacocca is. So, to bring those of you who weren't alive in those barren and painful years when muscle cars were replaced with the "K Car", let me bring you up to speed.



Lee Iacocca is the man responsible for the Ford Mustang – the *original* incarnation of the car that has been so deftly reincarnated. Lee was a driving force behind Ford's muscle car era. A marketing genius, he later joined Chrysler as it was about to tank and turned Chrysler around, spinning all sorts of deals with banks and Congress. The ubiquitous "K" car (a veritable bread box on wheels) gave way to a series of cars aimed straight at Baby Boomers and the younger generations to the point where he even tagged old friend Shelby to soup up the Plymouth Omni/Dodge Charger. It yielded a pocket rocket that was one of the hot rides in the first half of the 80's.

Fast forward: He's now 82-years old, but as feisty and outspoken as ever. Lee has a reputation for being a straight shooter and doesn't hold back at all, so his newest book, "Where Have All The Leaders Gone" is a candid look both backward and forward on the state of leadership in our country and a call to our citizens to act. And if nothing else, his book will get you to think, which is always healthy.

This book is written in a very comfortable and conversational style, which makes it both an easy and enjoyable read, even if you disagree with him on any point. It's also written in a style that will make it plain enough for even our youngest members to understand. If you want to get a grasp on some of the issues we face in this election year, there probably isn't a better book out there that can give you the facts so that you talk intelligently about what we, as a nation, need to do in the months and years to come. Iacocca's book is insightful, provocative, and educational. This bio/critique is worth reading and would make great material for any paper you might have to do for school or even for the joy of reading something for *entertainment*. Now there's a thought...

OA VOYAGE AT NORTHERN TIER

Have you ever seen the Northern Lights or portaged a canoe? If not, then the Order of the Arrow has the opportunity for you to participate in the OA Voyage Program at Northern Tier Canoe Base in Ely, Minnesota. Even if you have portaged a canoe or participated in the program previously, there are other opportunities available to you. All participants in the program are placed into

crews that will service a portage trail for one week as it is imperative as members of the Boy Scouts of America to leave things better than we found them. After learning



how to use a variety of tools and how to effectively perform a "J-stroke," you and your crew will design your very own trek. These treks are unique in that many of them are longer and travel to unchartered territory than the normal crews that leave the base. 
