ARROWCORPS5 A HIGHER ADVENTURE

In the summer of 2008, a contingent from Lowwapanew Lodge will travel to George Washington and Jefferson National Forests in Virginia as part of the 2008 ArrowCorps5 leadership in service initiative. ArrowCorps5 will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for each participant to set an example of leadership in service to those who treasure our national forests. 5,000 Arrowmen will converge on 5 different US Forest Service lands over 5 separate weeks.

The Virginia projects will occur from June 21-June 28, 2008 and will include a full day recreational opportunities such as white-water rafting, fishing, mountain biking and nearby historical sites. Participants will pay a reasonable fee to help pay for accommodations and meals during the project. Although the price to attend is still unknown, the age of participants is 16 to adult ... provided participants meet the "Philmont height and weight requirements". Keep Your Eye on the Prize which means the officers and members must always keep the goals in sight; strive to accomplish them to keep the Lodge on target.





COLLECTORS CORNER: FROM WHO TO LOWWAPANEAU

What is the history of #191 Lowwapaneau Lodge?



In 1942, #223 Acahela Lodge was chartered. Number 316 Quekolis came to be in 1969.

A merger of Acahela and Quekolis introduced Lodge #223 Gisichigin.



In 1985 Council territories realigned and Gisichigin reverted back to Acahela lodge #223.

The year of 1960 saw #542 Kiminschi and #543 Monsey lodges joining the Order.



A merger in 1962 of Monsey and Kiminschi created #542 Amad'ahi Lodge.

Acahela and Amad'ahi Lodges merged in 1991 to form #191 Lowwapaneau. The lodge number, 191, came from the date of new lodge formation, January 1991.



Our area has a good range of Order of the Arrow memorabilia to collect. Dollar values ranging from:

F1 issues of Kiminschi and Monsey lodges are around \$2,500.00.

HS1 issues of the same two lodges run \$15.00 each. The HS1 are historic solid-embroidered flaps issued by Amad'ahi as a fund raiser.



Quekolis items run about \$200.00 each.

Amad'ahi flaps go for \$20.00 each.

Acahela flaps run about \$15.00 each.

Gisichigin flaps are in the \$15.00 range.

Lowwapaneau standard issue flap is \$3.00.

The above price ranges are for standard uniform flaps. Event dated flaps run a bit higher.

GOT BROTHERHOOD?

“You need seek no rocky summit; for these high places are within you,” is perhaps one of the most quoted lines from the Pre-Ordeal ceremony. But what does it mean? How does it apply in one’s quest to fulfill their obligation to themselves as well as to the Order of the Arrow? How can one advance in life and spirit such as to gain a fuller knowledge of themselves and others? Is it even possible for one to understand the true nature of cheerfulness, service, and brotherhood?

None of the above questions can be definitively answered with a “yes”, “no”, or “maybe”. However, while we may never know the true nature of good values nor fully understand our own and other’s actions, there’s a program in the Order of the Arrow that will enable you to have a more complete understanding of them. The Brotherhood is a series of actions where Arrowmen come to understand the underlying truths and foundations of the principles and values of the Order of the Arrow. Brotherhood members also undergo a continuation of the journey started at the Ordeal. One of the more unique aspects of the Brotherhood process is it empowers the individual to take power of their growth; namely, it is solely the youth who decides when it is time to enter into the Brotherhood honor.

Do you think it’s time for you to become a Brotherhood member? If you do, there are two immediate opportunities awaiting you: the Spring Ordeal and the Fall Ordeal. At each Ordeal there will be a Brotherhood Training on Friday night followed by a Brotherhood Ceremony the next day. All you need to do is check the box that’s marked “Brotherhood” on the Ordeal pamphlet that will arrive soon, send in \$30.00 (This money covers the meals for the weekend as well as the sash.), and show up in Class A on Friday night of the Ordeal. You will receive further instructions on the Brotherhood training, hike, and ceremony at the Ordeal.
