structure and leadership established over many years of success at the Boy Scouts of America's high adventure bases. Working closely together, the United States Forest Service and the Order of the Arrow have chosen five national forests, spread across America, that will be the focus of our combined efforts. These sites are the Mark Twain Forest in Missouri, the Manti-La Sal Forest in Utah, the George Washington and Jefferson Forest in Virginia, the Shasta-Trinity Forest in California, and the Bridger-Teton National Forest in California. ArrowCorps5 will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for each participant to set an example of leadership in service to those who treasure our national forests.

Lowwapaneu Lodge has committed to sending 10 people to this program in 2008.

WHEN TO WEAR YOUR SASH

The question of when and wear to wear the Order of the Arrow sash is frequently asked and more frequently abused. For instance, can I wear the sash for my Troop photo at Camp or my home town parade? The answer is "no", for both as these are not OA events, unless the lodge leadership deems them as such.

The sash is only worn with the Scout field uniform (Class A) or the Scout dress uniform (blue blazer and grey slacks). It is not worn over a jacket or just with a t-shirt. It is appropriate in our Lodge to wear the sash as a youth wearing ceremonial attire and at other times approved by the Scout Executive and Lodge Advisor.



Sashes should not be altered with beads or other materials. Nothing should be worn on the sash, including signatures, patches, pins or legends.

The sash is worn over the right shoulder with the tip of arrow pointing over the right shoulder and diagonally across the chest. The sash is **not** to be worn in any other manner.

MY ORDER OF THE ARROW WILDERNESS VOYAGE EXPERIENCE

As Scouting's summer activities wind down, it is not too early to start thinking about next summer. The Order of the Arrow has three great high adventure opportunities for you to participate in during the summer. These opportunities are: OA Ocean Adventure located at Florida's Sea Base, OA Trail Crew at New Mexico's Philmont Scout Ranch, and OA Wilderness Voyage at Charles L. Sommers Canoe Base in Ely, Minnesota. Each of these programs lasts for two weeks with one week of service and one week of adventure. The three basic requirements for the programs are: 1) You must be at least 16 years of age but not yet 21. 2) You must be a registered member of an Order of the Arrow lodge. 3) You must be in good health at the time of the program.



This past July I had the privilege of attending the Wilderness Voyage in Minnesota. My voyage delivered as promised as we worked hard and had lots of fun. During our first week my crew engaged in various aspects of portage trail reconstruction. The trail work here is the first of any real kind since the early days when the trails were formed. I worked on a trail called Ensign to Trident where we had the challenge of putting in check dams and water bars that would help divert the water so it won't ruin the walkway for people. Our work will provide safe travel on boundary waters portage trails for many years to come. As a reward for a job well done providing service to the Boundary Waters, my crew designed its very one trek through the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness. This trip included seeing some waterfalls, Native American pictographs and also seeing wildlife in its purest form. During the second week of our voyage we canoed a one hundred plus mile journey through one of the last pristine forests in the world. The Wilderness Voyage truly allowed me to learn more about myself as its many challenges helped me develop physically, mentally and spiritually.

Extend yourself and participate in an OA high adventure. You will not regret it!

PHILMONT FOR \$150?

Have you always wanted to go to Philmont but it's just been a little bit outside of your price range? Well if you are between the ages of 16 and 21, you are eligible to participate in the Order of the Arrow Trail Crew Program at the Philmont Scout Ranch.

In the Summer of 2007, Arrowmen like yourself will be finishing a trail in the Mount Baldy region of the ranch — but it can only be completed with your help. The Trail Crew program provides valuable service for Scouts and Scouters of the future that will make the trek out to Cimarron, New Mexico.

The second week of the trip is a completely designed by you trip. Have you ever wanted to climb the Tooth of Time? Or have you wanted to do the Super Black Death trip where you hike 7 peaks in 1 day? Maybe, you've never been to the North Country and had the opportunity to summit Baldy. The choice is yours but you must sign up as soon as possible. Spots for the Summer of 2007 are already filling up and you'll want to get YOUR application in as soon as possible. The cost is \$150.00 plus transportation to the ranch.

NORTHERN TIER FOR \$125?

You can also have a similar experience to what Jack went through at Northern Tier. Each summer, the Order of the Arrow puts on programs at all three high adventure bases and encourages all Arrow men between the ages of 16 and 21 to participate.

The Wilderness Voyage program provides vital service to the Boundary Waters of Northern Minnesota. It is during this time that you will work with Arrowmen from across the country who have come for the very same reasons that you have: Fun, Fellowship and Adventure.

The second week of the program is designed by the participants themselves. You can paddle the 180 mile trek to International Falls, maybe the 8.5 mile portage to Lake Superior is what you want to do or maybe just to paddle around and see some of nature's beauty at it's finest.

This opportunity is available to you for the low cost of \$125.00 plus transportation. The Voyage is an unbeatable experience for the newest or oldest youth Arrowmen. I highly encourage you to visit http://adventure.oa-bsa.org or see Mr. Croom for information and application.
